FEBRUARY MEETING MINUTES

The C.A.R.S. February monthly meeting was called to order at 7:33 PM by club president Bob Check, W8GC on the 20th of the month. The meeting was held at the Busch Funeral Chapel Community Room in Parma, Ohio. Twenty-six members and one guest introduced themselves to begin the meeting.

Ron, K8VJG motioned to accept the January meeting minutes as published in the *Wobbly Oscillator*, and Terry, KB8DTC seconded. There were no additions or corrections noted, and the members passed the motion.

Tina, W8HBI gave the treasurer's report. She was glad to announce the interest on the club account paid for the scholarships.

Bob brought the group up to date on the progress the 2007 ARRL Great Lakes Division Convention Committee has made in the two committee meetings held since the last club meeting. The speakers and sponsors are all lined up, and Yeasu has donated a FT 857D radio for the door prize raffle. He said volunteers were needed as support staff, and mentioned the Portage County Amateur Radio Service contacted him and offered to help. Later, Bob informed the group the Yeasu FT 1000 MP transceiver and the ALS-600 amplifier have been sold. He said the R6000 vertical antenna had not yet been sold.

Gary, NI8Z reported the next VE session would be very well attended; at least twelve people are already signed up wanting to upgrade. He asked all VEs to make sure they would be there.

Bill, KC8YSV asked all ARRL members to pay their dues through C.A.R.S. He said the program for the March meeting would be a demonstration on CPR, given by Gale Franko, a RN from Parma Hospital. Bill passed around sign up sheets for volunteers for the convention. He asked for members to help with the hospitality functions, manning the sponsor tables and monitoring the repeater. Bill also asked for two still photographers and two video photographers.

Toby, WT8O reported the C.A.R.S. Technician and General classes are doing well, there are eight Technician students and nine General students. He thanked the instructors who have been helping. He

said the Wednesday night club net was doing fine, as well, and he encouraged more members to check in, and acknowledged the reliability of the net controllers. He also said it was time to start planning for Field Day, and passed around a sign-up sheet to get an idea of the people who were interested.

Dave, KD8V sent a get well card to Al Moriarty, N8CX. Al is the secretary of NODXA, and recently had a lower leg amputation. Dave later reported on the Copley Middle School Radio Club. He was very happy to say there are now twenty students involved with the club. Dave took a moment to thank Scottie and Bill for their help with the students.

Tom, WB8N requested anyone who would be submitting an article for the *Wobbly Oscillator*, to please have it in by February 25th.

The C.A.R.S. webmaster and technical committee chairman, Dave K8DAV, asked members to send him a QSL card so he could post a copy on the website. He said he had all the necessary parts to complete the Shaker Hts. Receiver. The work needed to complete the Parma repeater site will have to wait until the access road is passable. Dave thanked the twenty-three members who responded to his on-line survey. He mentioned the comments about Tom's editing of the *Wobbly Oscillator* were extremely complimentary.

Three prospective members were introduced to the group, Jacob Wagner, KD8CDC, Bob Whiddon, NT8K. and Mark Woodworth, WD8KHU. Steve, N8IS motioned to accept all three as members; and Terry, KB8DTC, seconded. The C.A.R.S. ceremonious election resulted in the acceptance and welcoming of all three hams into the club.

Bob asked for volunteers to help with the amateur radio demonstration for the upcoming Boy Scout event, "Scouting 360", which will be held on Saturday May 5th, at the Cuyahoga County Fairgrounds.

It was announced that Linda, N8LRS had recently passed her General Exam. All present congratulated her with a hearty round of applause. *continued on next page....*

The members voted on the motion presented at the meeting on January 9th, 2007 to change the C.A.R.S. Bylaw: Article X, Section 1, Paragraph B. The change essentially removed the two year time limit after high school graduation (or equivalent) to apply for the annual scholarship awards. The unanimous vote of the club members passed the motion.

Steve, N8IS announced he would be unable to continue as a Board of Directors member; and nominated Terry, KB8DTC as his replacement. The members unanimously voted to accept the nomination.

The winner of the evening's 50/50 raffle was Marc, KB8QHJ. Marc kindly donated his portion back to the club, \$52 was added to the club treasury.

A motion to close the meeting was made by Dave, K8DAV, and seconded by Steve, N8IS. The members passed the motion and the February meeting was adjourned at 8:31 PM.

After the meeting, Hal, W8PN, gave a very interesting presentation on radio astronomy.

MARCH INTERVIEW WITH THE V.P.

This months interview is with Bob, NT8K .

Q: How did you become interested in Amateur Radio...who or what helped you get your first license?

A: I was given a crystal set kit when I was about 12 years old. I was fascinated by short wave signals. A ham neighbor got me started by showing me his station. I borrowed an old signal corps tape machine to learn Morse code. I got my Tech license in 1956. It expired while I was serving in the Army during the Vietnam conflict.

Q: How long has you been licensed and what class license do you currently have?

A: I decided to re-acquire an amateur license in

December, 2006. I attended the CARS VE test session on January 14, 2007, passing elements 1 thru 4, and received my Extra class license January 23.

Q: What do you like about Amateur Radio?

A: I really enjoy meeting other hams on the air from around the country and around the world. Everyone is willing to pass on their advice and knowledge. I'm still pretty "new" to the hobby, and there's a lot to learn, which is a challenge as well as being fun.

Q: What are your favorite bands/modes to work ?

A: I'm somewhat limited by antennas and resources for now, but I do work some CW on 80 and 40 meters, and SSB on 80,40,17,15 and 10 meters. I check in on local 2 meter nets. I intend to be active in Skywarn. I'll probably work fairly low power, and have already worked Europe, South America and Marshall Islands on less than 100 watts. Lots of fun!

Q: What type of Ham radio equipment do you own or use?

A: Currently using an ICOM 746Pro transceiver into a simple dipole antenna for HF, and using a Diamond V2000 vertical for 6M and 2M. I Hope to install a Gap Titan vertical when weather permits. I'm fortunate to live on a hilltop.

Q: What type of work do you do? If retired what was your occupation?

A: I retired from the Summit County Engineer's office in 2001. I now dabble in music as a performing songwriter and open mic host. From time to time I do live sound mixing.

Q: Do you participate in any CARS projects or functions? If so which ones?

A: I'm brand new to the club, but look forward to future participation as opportunities arise. Looking forward to the Great Lakes convention in September of this year.

BREAKING NEWS

SUNSPOT CYCLE HITS BOTTOM?

In February we had low sunspot numbers, appropriate for the bottom of the solar cycle. The average daily sunspot number for February was just 17.3. The only months with lower average daily sunspot numbers in the past year were October (14.7) and February 2006 (5.3).

This month just might be the bottom of the cycle. View the table at:

and you'll see that the predicted smoothed sunspot number for March 2007 is 11.3, and it rises after that through the end of the year.

HERO, SILENT KEY

Ed was better known as the pilot of PAL Flight 434 which he piloted to a safe landing in December of 1994 despite the fact that a group connected to al-Quaeda had exploded a bomb on board.

HIGHER TECH

Tests of "Broadband Technology to Save Railroads" (BRT) Hits Snag.

The new initiative to transfer broadband over power lines (BPL) technology to broadband over railroad tracks (BRT) has hit unforeseen problems during early testing. Yesterday, the Gearvakf Scientific Studies Committee reported that its experiments with broadband transmissions over the Gorbinski & Ohio Rail System (G&ORS) caused an unusual number of derailments over the 12-month testing period. Although no specific cause has been pinpointed, Committee Chairman, Dr. Avruell U. Harnishe, thinks broadband activity is widening the gauge space between rails. -KB8WFH, W8FYO, W8LCZ, W8OG, KVM5149 WLW, 2E26, 6146B, et al.
